With Guest Speaker **Rabbi Mark S. Golub** Founder & CEO of JBS

### **Topic:** What Does It Mean To Be A Zionist As An American Jew In the 21st Century?

Rabbi Mark Golub is the founder and CEO of the Jewish Broadcasting Service, formerly Shalom TV. Lauded by *Newsweek* as one of America's most influential rabbis, Rabbi Golub is recognized within American Jewry as a leading interviewer and television producer. His award-winning national program, "L'Chayim," has aired continuously since 1979 with a guest list that reads like a "Who's Who" on the world Jewish scene.

Rabbi Golub is a gifted teacher with an unusual ability to explain the genius of the Jewish tradition and the uniqueness of Jewish values. He has taught in the CCNY Jewish Studies Department and HUC-JIR's Cantorial School and School of Education. In addition, he is a frequent guest lecturer throughout the country on the meaning of being Jewish and on *Midrash* (Jewish commentaries to the Bible).

Rabbi Golub's eclectic family background provides him with a unique appreciation for every major movement of Jewish life. His maternal grandfather was an Orthodox rabbi; his paternal grandparents helped create the Reconstructionist movement, and his father assisted in founding the first Conservative synagogue in Trumbull, Connecticut. Mark S. Golub was ordained a Reform Rabbi by the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in New York City.

### From The Rabbi

On the first day of Rosh Hashanah I invited each member of the congregation to submit an OP-ED article for Temple Talk as a personal answer to the question: What is so great about being Jewish? In my sermon I suggested



some possible answers to this question, but I emphasized how important it is for each of us to be able to answer this question from our own personal and unique perspectives.

The Fall Holiday Season has just ended and I can say without any hesitation that for me, one of the greatest things about being Jewish is to have 15 days of the first 23 days of the beginning of a new year that are special holy days. It is an awesome experience to begin the New Year by celebrating: two days of Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, seven days of Sukkot, Shemini Atzeret, Simchat Torah and three Shabbatot. I am grateful for the energy, renewed sense of purpose, clarification of priorities, increased closeness to God and to my Jewish identity and the joy of spending quality time with family and friends, all of which have been part of this special time. So, here is one of my many answers to the question:

### What's so great about being Jewish?

The unique way in which each New Year begins and the significant impact that this makes upon me.

Printed below is the first OP-ED that was submitted as an answer to this question. As this year 5779 continues, I hope there will be many more submissions so that we can all learn from each other.

### We All Need An Anchor

In a provocative Rosh Hashanah sermon, Rabbi Yaffe challenged the congregation to submit their thoughts on what makes Judaism great. For me, the answer is obvious: Judaism is a perennial anchor in uncertain times. And current times are indeed uncertain, with political pundits continuously uttering "unprecedented times" as if going out of style.

Yet are current times uniquely uncertain or, should we take solace in Paul Harvey's words that "In times like these it's helpful to remember there have always been times like these?" And perhaps even further equanimity might come from realizing that "times like this" have been repeated in nearly 4,000 years of Jewish history, a history replete with turmoil, cataclysm and disaster, yet equally filled with resilience, perseverance, and triumph.

This anchor of Jewish history is a perennial beacon of hope. Reflecting for a moment on 4,000 years of Jewish humility, generosity, and caring helps us apply the same mindful approach to the challenges of today. And reflecting a bit further on the result of 4,000 years of good deeds, thoughts, and attitudes is a testament to the wonder, tenacity, and potential of the Jewish people.

We all need anchors and as Jews we are fortunate to have one of the strongest known. And with this history as prologue, the next 4,000 years of Jewish accomplishment eagerly await the contributions of our generation and those to come.

### From Your Co-Vice President of Membership By Karen Popowsky




I joined the Little Neck Jewish Center in September





Now feeling more confident with a personal connection to this operation, we proceeded down to the basement to check the etrogim stash. Our dealer introduced himself as Zohar. It was clear that he was "the man." He presented us with a ping pong table filled with etrogim. On our side of the net were the boxes, prepared for our inspection. On the other side was the special stuff - secret stash. Box after box of large beautiful etrogim fetching top dollar and all spoken for, according to Zohar.

We proceeded to inspect our allotted fruit and continued inspecting and kept on inspecting, in search of the best 21 etrogim that met the Rabbi's very stringent standards that included color, shape and texture. According to Zohar, we went through about 400 etrog boxes. Rabbi Yaffe, with the eyes of a hawk, went over each and every detail of every etrog in the "warehouse."

While he was inspecting, we chatted with Zohar about what to do with the etrogim after Sukkot. After the usual jam and potpourri, other ideas came up. Zohar shared with us the secret of making Etrog infused Vodka. No one saw that coming! The silence was only broken when Zohar announced with a sly smile, that he had some and he would get it for us to try. He returned with a Scotch bottle half filled with some mystery liquid and asked who would like to try it, first of course, confirming that we were all over 18...no takers. Two hours later we were still inspecting and only 18 etrogim had made the cut. I am not sure if it was the fatigue or the late hour or the vodka, but a number of brave souls started going over the rejected batch of etrogim, searching for the diamonds in the rough that would pass the Rabbi's high standards. Perhaps Zohar knew what he was doing with the vodka after all - we managed to find 3 more etrogim that we convinced the Rabbi were worthy.

When inspecting an etrog, you know you have the right one because it speaks to you. In fact, one of the very special etrogim on the other side of the net called out to our Rabbi. It was the mother of all etrogim – a beautiful shade of yellow, no blemishes and a perfect petom (stem for the uninitiated). We could all tell that this etrog had cast its spell on the Rabbi. Even Zohar knew that the Rabbi and that etrog were inseparable.

Some murmurs and negotiations later, the money and the lulavim and etrogim all changed hands and we headed back to more familiar environs...An evening we will all remember, with a vodka haze of course.
