

From The Rabbi

On Thursday, April 8, I attended a Community Conversation, via Zoom, that was convened by New York State Senator John C. Liu to discuss the issue of anti-Asian Hate that has become a plague within our country. As a leader within our community, together with other religious and civic leaders, I was invited to make a brief statement.

I began my remarks by referring to the Biblical idea that every human being is created in the image of G-d and I quoted from the Book of Leviticus:

> You shall not hate your brother in your heart. You shall not take vengeance or bear a grudge against your fellow countrymen You shall love your fellow as yourself.

I shared that the Jewish interpretation of the Golden Rule is to live by the imperative:

That which is hateful to you, Do not do unto your fellow human being.

Then, I recognized that it is not that hard to talk the talk, but if talk does not evolve into action then the talk is meaningless. As part of this Community Conversation, I then made the following statement:

I live in an Asian neighborhood and I do not know my neighbors.

I then made a public pledge to mount an effort to build bridges between the members of the local Jewish community and members of the local Asian community. I pledged to bring members of our neighborhood together to get to know one another and to identify common ground that we share.

Immediately after the meeting I called my friend Reverend Lindsay Lunnum of the Zion Episcopal Church who also attended the meeting and also made a statement. As we spoke, I decided to alter my pledge from simply bringing members of the Jewish and the Asian communities together, to bringing the Asian and non-Asian members of our community within the context of our interfaith network of community clergy. Before our phone conversation was over, Reverend Lindsay and I set a date and time for a meeting of our local Asian and non-Asian clergy to get together for the purpose of getting to know one another as the first step of enabling our local clergy to embrace the goal of building bridges between the Asian and non-Asian members of our community.

On Tuesday, April 27 we had our first meeting and we concluded that meeting by setting the next meeting for Tuesday, May 11. At our first meeting 11 members of our local clergy attended and we have identified another 10 members of local clergy to whom we are reaching out to join us at the next meeting.

I consider it an honor and a privilege to be part of this process and I am looking forward to the day when there will be a social gathering of our Asian and non-Asian neighbors in which we will begin to get to know one another and rejoice in beauty of friendship and shared aspirations.

To quote the wisdom of Rabbi Nachman of Bratislav:

The whole world is a narrow bridge, But the essence is not to be afraid.

Let us not be afraid of crossing the bridges that divide us. Let us have the courage to walk the walk that will help us to discover the unknown and to become part of the process that will bring us together with our neighbors.

A full report to the general membership will be presented at a virtual General Membership meeting on Monday, June 7th. Prior to that date, we will be holding focus group meetings to present updated information. Previous focus group meetings helped the committee in formulating our position on key issues. However, I'll be the first to admit that I kind of liked the convenience of Zoom services. For one thing, my commute decreased from 90+minutes to about 12 seconds. But seriously, I've truly enjoyed my increased interaction with the community. I used to be at the synagogue once or twice a week. Now, I participate every day!

And it seems I'm not the only one. Many of you have re-discovered the joy of synagogue services, classes, and programs from the comfort of your family room or kitchen – without the need to dress up, find a parking space, or get there early in order to secure a good seat. Congregation L'Dor V'Dor hasn't missed a beat, and to say the least, we are thriving online!

However, perhaps we've become TOO comfortable over the past 14 months. Do you even remember what life was like before Zoom? - 9. Your Zoom background does not follow you to the sanctuary. You can no longer pretend to join us for services while on the beach in Jamaica.
- 10. Please note: "Zooming" at home is perfectly acceptable. "Zooming" on the way to services will probably get you pulled over.

I hope that these tips help you ease back into "the real world" safely and comfortably.

In all seriousness, I simply cannot wait to sing with the community once again! Leading services from home has been a great experience, but with everyone muted, I always feel like I'm singing by myself. There's nothing like the real thing, and I cannot wait to see AND hear everyone in person!

Itzhak Brook, MD, is a Professor of Pediatrics at Georgetown University in Washington DC and the past chairperson of the Anti-infective Drug Advisory Committee of the United States FDA.

He was born and raised in Haifa, earning his medical degree from Hebrew University, Hadassah School of Medicine, Dr Brook completed his pediatrics training at Kaplan Hospital in Rehovot, He served in the Israeli army as a medic in the Six Day War in 1967 and as a battalion physician during the Yom Kippur war in 1973. Subsequently, he completed a fellowship in infectious diseases at the University of California, Los Angeles. Dr. Brook served in the US Navy for 27 years. Itzhak is the author of the book "In the Sands of Sinai, a Physician's Account of the Yom Kippur War". He is a regular speaker for the Israeli Embassy in the USA.

The Vignes twin sisters will always be identical. But after growing up together in a small, southern black community and running away at age sixteen, it's not just the shape of their daily lives that is different as adults, it's everything: their families, their communities, their racial identities. Many years later, one sister lives with her black daughter in the same southern town she once tried to escape. The other passes for white, and her white husband knows nothing of her past. Still, even separated by so many miles and just as many lies, the fates of the twins remain intertwined. What will happen to the next generation, when their own daughters' storylines intersect?

Weaving together multiple strands and generations of this family, from the Deep South to California, from the 1950s to the 1990s, Brit Bennett produces a story that is at once a riveting, emotional family story and a brilliant exploration of the American history of passing. Looking well beyond issues of race, *The Vanishing Half* considers the lasting influence of the past as it shapes a person's decisions, desires, and expectations, and explores some of the multiple reasons and realms in which people sometimes feel pulled to live as something other than their origins.

The Power of the Psalms

As we approach the holiday of Shavuot, we contemplate where we are in space and time. We've left Egypt, gone through the Exodus and find ourselves wandering through the desert trying to figure out who we are as a people, and where we're going. Our destination is the mountain, where we will receive the word of G-d, but we don't know that yet. Right now, we're working on ourselves, trying to perfect and prepare for the next phase. Though the desert can be a place that does not support growth, there is always the potential for things to blossom and thrive.

Perhaps that's what G-d sees in us-not who we are but rather, who we are capable of becoming.

Passover and Shavuot are sewn together by the Omer, which bridges together the months of Nisan, Iyar and Sivan, and also binds together the Exodus and the giving of the Torah.

The festival of Shavuot marks both the Birthday and the Yahrzeit of King David. Because Ruth was the matriarch of the Davidic dynasty, it is on this holiday that we read her story. The Book of Ruth is found in the Ketuvim, the third portion of the Hebrew Bible. One of the other books found in the Ketuvim is the Book of Psalms, thought to be authored mostly by King David.

In addition to being one of the most successful Kings, David was a warrior, a poet and a musician of the harp. Though he reigned for 40 years as a great ruler, he was not perfect. He spent much of his early years in hiding and on the run, and he defied two of the 10 Commandments when he committed adultery and murder.

Many of the Psalms were born out of his struggles.

The Psalms, also known in Hebrew as Tehilim, are recited as a source of protection and known for their healing powers. They are also recited as a means of solace and inspiration. The word Psalm comes from the Greek word Psalmos which means songs sung to the harp, or Psallein, which means to pluck.

There are 150 Psalms in the book of Tehilim, many of which comprise the liturgy of today's synagogue service. The Ashrei, Psukei D'Zimrah, and Kabbalat Shabbat services are quoted straight from the Psalms.

"Out of the mouth of Babes" (8.3), "The Lord is my shepherd" (23.1), and "If I forget thee Jerusalem" (137.5) are all famous passages originating from Psalms.

The Psalms are divided into 30 days of each month. If you recite the Psalms assigned to each day, by the end of the month you will have recited all 150. This is very powerful.

Reciting the Psalms creates a give and take between man and G-d. The passion and sentiments we hear are something we all share and seek to express at one time or another. In many places there are prayer groups reciting Psalms for those who are ill. Reciting the Psalms can be universally transformative. Reciting the Psalms provide a powerful source of comfort and inspiration.

The language of the Psalms consists of both poetry and prose. The difference is that poetry is circular. It moves back on itself and is a beautiful form of written expression. Prose always moves forward in a linear fashion and tells you what happens consecutively over time.

Psalm 114 is a beautiful example of a Psalm that is prosaic and poetic at the same time. It is prosaic in that it articulates the progression of three events as they happened chronologically in history. Within the Psalm are the following words:

When Israel went forth from Egypt...

The sea saw something and fled...

The mountains skipped like rams, the hills like sheep.

The prose of this Psalm turns into poetry. On the surface we read about three chronological events:

The Exodus from Egypt
The Splitting of the Sea of Reeds
The Trembling of the Mountains
(During the Revelation at Mount Sinai)

Poetically, this Psalm describes the Exodus from Egypt, the Splitting of the Sea and the giving of the Torah as One event! For G-d, who transcends time and space, these events are seen as a mere moment in Time. To G-d it doesn't matter that 40 days or 40 years or 400 years went by. The Gift of Freedom, the Manifestation of G-d's Presence and the Gift of Law, all bend back on each other. All are important, all are sacred, and all are connected.

Poetry gives impression rather than sequence. This beautiful Psalm does just that by weaving together these 3 major happenings into one awesome event!

As we celebrate Shavuot, may the Poetry and Prose of Psalm 114 help us to understand the important connection between Passover and Shavuot and between Freedom and Receiving of the Torah.
