



Presidential Matters

Do I dare say, “back to normal” fully believing that better days are here in the synagogue? I’m going to respond affirmatively based on clear observations. It certainly presents a bright outlook as we head into 2023. Consider this:

- Nearly 50 congregants attended our very popular Chanukah dinner at the synagogue on December 23rd. We braved a bitterly cold night to enjoy latkes and Chinese food (what else!) and come together for this annual event. Yes, we’ve been away but the food and conversation is an indication we picked up right where we left off. Led by Rabbi Yaffe and Cantor Shron, it really was a meaningful ‘welcome home’ celebration.
- The sanctuary is filling up more each week as congregants are becoming more comfortable participating in-house. Of course, we will always be sensitive to those members who determine that the virtual option is the best – right now - and we will continue to provide our zoom room for programming and services.
- Hundreds of NYC public school students came to the synagogue to watch Plaza Theatrics put on separate productions of Jack Frost and Scrooge. The Plaza Organization has been recognized for its contributions to the arts via various arts-in-education programs. Plaza will be using our social hall to entertain young children periodically throughout the winter. In speaking with Kevin Harrington, the producer, he emphasized the importance of exposing children to professional theater with productions suited for their level. OLNJC is playing an important role by hosting these plays. I have been told that our own administrator-in-charge, Ms. Audi Acevedo, will be starring in a must-see upcoming performance. Like many star performers, Audi has not responded to TT inquiries, choosing to wait for a formal press conference to announce her intentions.

Some very positive notes, no doubt, but the issue at our doorstep hasn’t changed; in fact, virtual programming has side-tracked meaningful fund raising efforts. Once you miss a week or two of coming to the shul, it becomes easy to forget about its role in our lives. If one of the greatest human qualities is resiliency, we adjust and reflect on the good our involvement has meant to the synagogue. So, resiliency dictates that we respect and cherish what we have built and how our contributions have steadfastly maintained the house that each of us has come to share simchas and gain the comfort of being with friends and our synagogue family.

Nothing replaces that.

You’ve heard it before: the demographics have changed. Members move, etc. All that means is each of us has to step up and do whatever we can (that is all we ask) to help us maintain what we have all come to depend on whether on a weekly, monthly, or pretty much annual basis. It doesn’t matter how often; what matters is it here for you and me and we won’t let that slip away; it’s part of who we are.

Over the next several weeks, a special committee chaired by Executive vice-president Robert Stern, will be reviewing all operations of the synagogue and making recommendations as to where we can improve.

However, while I am certain that no one is better suited to lead this task and that the committee members will exchange various opinions, we all agree on one concept: Charity Begins at Home. From The Cantor



Happy 2023! I want to wish you a new year filled with, as the late Art Raymond of WEVD Radio would say, “health and wealth and time to enjoy them.”

Now that Chanukah is over and we’ve settled into the “dead of winter”, this time of year can feel gloomy, dark, and depressing. Heck, even our non-Jewish friends have taken down their beautiful twinkling Christmas lights, adding to the chill.

With no significant Jewish holidays in sight (despite the weekly warmth of Shabbat), even the Jewish calendar can’t save us from a time of year that we simply have to “get through” as we await the rebirth of spring.

Well, not so fast. If we play our cards right, Tu B’shvat has the power to brighten our lives during this dark, cold time of year.

Tu B’shvat, the “Jewish Arbor Day”, is here to brighten the darkness on Monday, February 6, 2023. In ancient times, Tu B’shvat was less of a holiday and more of a legal milestone for Jewish farmers – kind of like a fiscal new year for modern businesses. According to MyJewishLearning.com:

“The Torah states, ‘When you enter the land [of Israel] and plant any tree for food, you shall regard its fruit as forbidden. Three years it shall be forbidden for you, not to be eaten’ (Leviticus 19:23). The fruit of the fourth year was to be offered to the priests in the Temple as a gift of gratitude for the bounty of the land, and the fifth-year fruit—and all subsequent fruit—was finally for the farmer. This law, however, raised the question of how farmers were to mark the “birthday” of a tree. The Rabbis therefore established the 15th of the month of Shevat as a general “birthday” for all trees, regardless of when they were actually planted.”

In medieval times, however, Jewish mystics gave Tu B’shvat more significance – taking the opportunity to celebrate nature, produce, and the land of Israel. In more modern times, Tu B’shvat became a celebration of nature in the State of Israel, celebrating the miracle of “making the desert bloom” for nearly 75 years.

I’m no tree-hugger...but to me, the intricacies of nature are all the proof you need to know that there is a God. The fact that nature generally works so flawlessly – climate change concerns aside - tells me that there is a grand designer behind it all. It only makes sense that Judaism sets aside a day to marvel at the wonder of it all.

But in the dead of winter, when nothing is growing? Why?

Rabbi Yaakov Asher Sinclair (look him up on YouTube) suggests that there are two ways we can look at nature this time of year.

We can think of the trees as “dead” in winter, frozen over and barren until spring comes to share its warmth.

But if we look beneath the surface, there is much more to the story.

Beneath the surface, *winter* is actually the time of rebirth. It’s the time when roots start to take shape deep into the earth. Sap begins to form from within the tree. Nature is busily preparing for its triumphant return.

“You can look at winter in one of two ways,” Rabbi Sinclair suggests. “You can look at it as the death of the autumn, or you can look at it as the birth of spring.”

No need to be depressed this time of year. Winter is just God’s way of putting up a “coming soon” sign to get us excited for nature’s “grand opening” in a couple of months.

Tu B’shvat offers us an annual opportunity to celebrate nature at a time when we need to remind ourselves of its magic and grandeur. Take advantage of this day – and every day - to marvel at God’s wondrous creations that we often take for granted.







Parents' Weekend at SUNY BUFFALO - Visit to the on-campus Jewish Community Center by Lisa Tamari

On Shabbat Shuva (September 29), Shahar and I were finally able to visit our daughter, Emily, during a Parents' Weekend at SUNY Buffalo. I say "finally" because although Emily is in her third year, the Covid pandemic and her sister's Bat Mitzvah made any earlier Parents' Weekend visit impossible. Because Emily is involved in activities that the campus Jewish community offers at SUNY Buffalo, we decided to share a Shabbat Dinner there, which was well attended by a group of 50 Jewish students, including some visiting parents. We were all warmly received by Rabbi Gurary and Rebbetzin Rifka. 
