From The Rabbi

Recently, our Shabbat morning services have been significantly enriched by members of our synagogue family embracing the memory of their loved ones beyond the rituals of reciting the Mourner's Kaddish and having a Torah



Aliyah. On one Shabbat in April, the 25th anniversary of a father's Yahrzeit was observed by a son leading Shacharit and Hallel, reading Torah, having an Aliyah and speaking about his father. This was all observed together with four generations of the family gathering together in the sanctuary for services and enjoying a Shabbat Kiddush after services together with the congregation. On a different Shabbat, a member of our synagogue family who tragically lost her daughter to cancer when she was a young woman in her early 40s, was in shul with her two daughters who had an Aliyah together and her niece who chanted the Haftarah in honor of the memory of her first cousin. I could feel the joy of the family being together, feeling the blessing of the memory of their daughter, sister and cousin and drawing strength from being in the synagogue sanctuary.

In addition to the truly meaningful Yahrzeit experiences, we have also had the opportunity to celebrate significant Bar Mitzvah anniversaries. In addressing a member of our synagogue family who celebrated the 60th anniversary of his becoming a Bar Mitzvah by chanting the Haftarah that he chanted 60 years ago, I reminded him that to every Bar Mitzvah Boy I say, "becoming a Bar Mitzvah is not the end or completion of your Jewish learning and your Jewish life, but only the beginning. We pray that as you continue on the journey of life as an adult that you will continue to actively participate in Jewish life and be guided by the teachings of the Torah." It is a great source of joy when a "Bar Mitzvah Boy" celebrates the 60th anniversary of his becoming a Bar Mitzvah together with the members of his synagogue family and brings with him the experience of having lived his adult life guided by the wisdom of Torah and the observance of Mitzvot.

In these next two months of May and June we will be celebrating in our sanctuary a 60th and an 80th anniversary of two Bar Mitzvah Boys and a 50th Wedding Anniversary.

It is a blessing when memories of loved ones and celebrations of significant anniversaries bring families and friends together with love and joy to celebrate Shabbat, feel the presence of God, and embrace the gift of life.

When I was first introduced to the Little Neck Jewish Center that has become Congregation L'Dor V'Dor-Oakland Little Neck Jewish Center, I was told that this is a Heimeshe shul. Heimishe can be understood as warm, welcoming and down to earth. I am grateful that we continue to embrace this identity and we welcome all who are interested in sharing your joy and remembrances and putting your special date on our shul calendar.

From The Cantor

As many of you know, one of my passions in life is my weekly radio show and podcast about Israeli music (to hear it, visit MyIsraeliMusic.com). As a lifelong "radio geek", I love spending time in the studio, sharing my enthusiasm with thousands of listeners each week. Plus, the music helps me connect to Israel and its culture in a deep and meaningful way.



Every so often, I'll send out an email to promote the show to my mailing list. A few months back, I sent a message with the subject line "How Is Your Community Celebrating Israel's 75th?"

Moments after sending, I received a chilling one-sentence reply from a listener in Florida:

"Given Israel's new racist government, we will not be celebrating Israel's 75th."

It was like I was punched in the gut. Not celebrating Israeli Independence Day? Sure, there's reason for concern these days, and plenty of room for frustration. But how could someone turn their back on the State of Israel because of the faults of a few temporary caretakers?

Sadly, in the weeks that followed, I learned she wasn't alone. Beginning with the election of Israel's current government, and continuing through the period of unprecedented protests that have swept the country, an alarming number of U.S. Jews have become lukewarm (at best) in their support for the Jewish State.

I think this is a grave mistake.

While it is natural to have disagreements with the political party in power (in Israel as well as in the U.S.A.), it is crucial for Jews to continue to support Israel. Here are some reasons why:

- 1. Israel is a haven for Jews. For centuries, Jews have been persecuted and discriminated against in various parts of the world. Israel provides a safe and secure home for Jews, where they can practice their religion and culture without fear of persecution. Though we tend to forget this while living comfortably in New York, Jews around the world are much safer with Israel on the map. Supporting Israel is not just about politics, but also about protecting Jewish lives and ensuring their safety.
- 2. Israel is a vital ally of the United States. Regardless of the parties in power, our two countries share many common values, including democracy, freedom, and human rights. Israel is a crucial partner in the fight against terrorism and the promotion of stability in the Middle East. Supporting Israel strengthens the ties between the United States and Israel and helps advance common interests.
- 3. Israel is a source of pride for Jews. Israel is a remarkable success story of a small nation that has overcome significant challenges to become a thriving and prosperous country. Israel has made remarkable contributions to the world in areas such as technology, science, medicine, and culture. Supporting Israel is not just about politics but also about celebrating Jewish achievements and promoting Jewish identity.

As you'll see in the pages of this month's Temple Talk, Israel remains at the heart of nearly everything we do at Congregation L'Dor V'Dor. See page 6 for an in-depth look at how our members remain informed about – and inspired by – the State of Israel on the occasion of her 75th birthday.

No, we are not blind to the faults of the country. Yes, there is definite reason for concern. Yes, we absolutely need to make our voices heard when necessary. But even in the face of frustration, let's continue to recite the words of the Prayer for Israel with admiration and hope: "Avinu She-bashamayim, Rock and Redeemer of the people Israel: Bless the State of Israel, with its promise of redemption....Bless the Land with peace, and its inhabitants with lasting joy. And let us say: Amen."

Congregation L'Dor V'Dor Celebrates


Israel @ 75

The Torah as G-d's Mind

When a poet writes, or a painter paints, or a sculptor sculpts, and creates a piece of art, what are they giving to you?

It's not the poem, the painting, or the sculpture. What they are giving you is a piece of themselves. They are giving you a piece of their soul.

That's what G-d gave to us.

G-d put His soul in a moment and gave it to us. One G-d gave us one Torah, on One day, in One moment, in One utterance, in One place, to One nation, at One time. It was a One shot deal. But, each person chooses to receive the Torah, to experience it and to hear G-d speaking to him/her in his/her own way, according to their own capacity, and their own level of understanding, throughout the year, all the time. That's why there's no date for the holiday of Shavuot. We are experiencing it all the time. We are always cultivating, nurturing, and expanding our consciousness of the Torah.

"Delve into it again and again. Use it to see the truth, for all is in it. Grow old in it and depart not from it. Turn it and turn it for everything is in it"(Pirkei Avot)

The Torah speaks to us differently at different phases of life.

Sinai was unique. It was a one time event. All of us stood at the mountain together. Physically it will never happen again. But spiritually it happens everytime we choose to receive Torah. In daily life, whether it be conducting business, collecting shells on the beach, dealing with difficult people, or watching a glorious sunset, ask yourself, what is my Torah? If you sense the divine presence in your actions and how you respond to everyday situations, G-d is speaking to you.

In the Zohar it says that the Torah is a single mystical Name. It is one long word or name of G-d. There are no vowels in the Torah. The Mahral of Prague, a 16th century Rabbi, says that at Sinai we heard one single utterance, and in that single utterance were all the Mitzvot. We heard one utterance, "Anochi ", the first word of the 10 commandments. And that's all we had to hear.

Anochi is an acronym for "Anah Nafshi Katavit Yahvit-" I, my soul, have written and given. The Zohar says that G-d created the Torah before He created the world. Like an architect who refers to a blueprint, G-d looked into the Torah (His Mind) and created the world.

The Torah is G-d's mind.

At the time of creation, G-d spoke in the form of a monologue. Monologue can be accomplished without formulating thought into words. It's like when you think to yourself. G-d was thinking to Himself.

Dialogue, on the other hand, takes place between two parties. There is consideration of the other one's level of understanding. This is how G-d spoke to us at Sinai. He had to adapt His speech to our level of understanding. More than G-d spoke to us, He infused the Torah into us. G-d and Torah are one and the same.

Shavuot is like a romantic love story.

It is the Divine wedding and the Torah is the ketubah. Passover is the Betrothal, Shavuot is the Ketubah, Sukkot is the Chuppah, and Simchat Torah is the Dance Party!

May we be attuned to receiving the voice of G-d in our everyday life, and may the living words of Torah speak to us now and throughout the whole year. See you at Sinai!



Reflections80 Years in About 80 Seconds



June 26, 1943: a warm, sunny Shabbos morning, began with a walk from 247th St. in Bellerose to the Queens Jewish Center on Hollis Hills Blvd. With my parents, my Bubbie and Zeide and my sister. It was my Bar Mitzvah day. My father led Shacharis and Zeide led Musaf and I chanted the Haftarah. I can't remember my emotions, nervous I guess, yet relieved that the day had finally come. Of course, there was the usual speech and then a party the next day at Ward Ave. Synagogue (in the Bronx—my uncle was the caterer). In a flash, it was over. Little did I realize (or probably never thought about) what the future had in store for me.

I graduated elementary school that June, went to Brooklyn Technical HS where I majored in chemistry, started going nights to Brooklyn College and got a job in a lab in the paint industry. In 2000, 53 years and two jobs later, I retired as the president of a laboratory which specialized in paint and sealant technology.

During that span, I met and married Esther, my love and guiding light. In 1952 I went into the army and served in Korea. After coming home, we started a family. We had 3 children. I graduated from Brooklyn College, then came 4 grandchildren and then 4 great-grandchildren. What blessings.

I retired in 2000 and we bought a condo in Florida which we have been using every winter since. Now on June 17, 2023 I will once again chant Haftarah Shelach. 
