From the Rabbi

In these two months of March and April there are five special Shabbatot:



April 20

Shabbat Shekalim March 9 Shabbat Hachodesh April 6 March 23 **Shabbat Zachor Shabbat Hagadol** Shabbat Parah March 30

On each of these Shabbatot there is a special reading from the Torah and a special Haftarah that help us to learn about and embrace the significance of these Shabbatot that are part of the spiritual preparation for the celebration of Purim and Pesach. In this column I will share some wisdom on Shabbat Shekalim that will be on Saturday, March 9. At our Shabbat Experiences on Saturday, March 16 and Saturday April 20 we will continue our learning about these special Shabbatot.

The following is some wisdom from the staff of the OU.

In the Talmud we learn of a connection between Shabbat Shekalim and Purim.

Reish Lakish said: It is revealed and known in advance, to the One who spoke and the world came into being, that in the future Haman was going to weigh out shekels against the Jewish people; therefore, God arranged that the Jewish people's shekels that were given to the Temple preceded Haman's shekels. And this is as we learned in a mishna (Shekalim 2a): On the first of Adar the court makes a public announcement about the contribution to the Temple of half-shekels that will soon be due, and about the need to uproot forbidden mixtures of diverse kinds of seeds from the fields now that they have begun to sprout. Therefore, it turns out that the Jewish people give the shekels on the first of Adar, preceding the date of Haman's planned destruction of the Jewish people and his own collecting of shekels. (Megilla 13b)

The Yerushalmi similarly suggests that the merit of the Jews' communal participation in the sacrificial service, through the donation of the half shekal, protected them from Haman's edict, which included a payment of money ("eshkol"- Ester 3:9) to the roval treasury.

Rabbi Moshe Alshich (Safed, 1508-1593), in his Torah commentary (Shemot 30:11), explains that the commandment to donate specifically a half-shekel (as opposed to a complete shekel) demonstrates how all members of the nation combine to comprise a single, organic whole.

The unity of the Jewish people, as demonstrated through the half shekel donation, counters Haman's accusation that the Jews are "a certain people scattered abroad and dispersed among the peoples" (Esther 3:8). When each member of the Jewish people recognizes that he or she is just a half, one part of the greater whole, this engenders a sense of unity within the nation. With this unity the members of the nation become worthy of forgiveness and immune to Haman's plans. As the Yerushalmi adds, "Therefore, we precede Purim with Shabbat Shekalim on which we read the section in the Torah regarding the offering of the 1/2 Shekel. This helps us to remember and internalize the true reason behind our redemption from the evil designs of Haman.

Each year on Shabbat Shekalim, in preparation for the celebration of Purim, we remember, and internalize, the true reason behind our redemption from the evil designs of Haman.

We are living in time that once again we as a Jewish people are being attacked, not just in Israel, but all over the world. The message of Shabbat Shekalim leading up to the celebration of Purim is the importance of building and maintaining unity within our Jewish family. At times we may agree to disagree, but at the end of the day our tradition teaches us to embrace each other with love. We hope to guided by the values of our tradition and our relationship with God. This can give us strength to walk on the path of life guided by truth and this can help us to be partners with God to bring peace and harmony to our world.

After 35 years as a practicing accountant, I finally obtained my dream job; a Cantor's position throughout the year.



I literally grew up in a shul, The Conservative Synagogue, Adath Israel of Riverdale. My father was very active in the shul as a layman and was in the building every night. Figuring that seemed like a good place to be, I did all my homework at the shul and, of course, attended services every Friday night, Saturday morning and Saturday afternoon.

As a result of being in the building all the time, the Rabbi, Chaim Pearl, took me under his tutelage. Over the years I developed a complete synagogue skill-set.






"The Museum of Failures" by Thrity Umrigar

Sale of Chametz

During the week of Pesach, it is forbidden for any Jew to own chametz. To avoid the unnecessary financial hardship that could result from requiring Jews to dispose of all items that are chametz, it has become customary to sell items of chametz to non-Jews for the week of Pesach. If you would like to sell your chametz to insure that you abide by the Jewish law of not owning any chametz during the week of Pesach, please fill out the form below and return it to the synagogue office on or before **Thursday**, **April 18**.

Moses said to Pharaoh:

"Let my people go so that we may serve our G-d."

Today we don't need to ask Pharaoh. All we need to do is come to the synagogue! On this Festival of Freedom, let us exercise our freedom to be Jewish and join together for services on Passover.

Calling All First Born (Men and Women) Siyyum Bechorim Monday, April 22 at 7:15 a.m.

According to Jewish law, all Jews who are the first born children of either their father or mother should fast on the day before Passover (or two days before when Pesach begins on Saturday night) in commemoration of the deliverance of the first born children of the ancient Israelites from the angel of death. However, individuals who are obligated to fast are exempted from fasting if they have the opportunity to participate in a **seudat mitzvah**, a festive meal that follows the performance of certain mitzvot. Therefore, it has become customary for synagogues, on the day before Passover, to make a **siyyum**, a public completion of the study of a passage from the Torah, which is followed by a **seudat mitzvah**, a meal associated with fulfilling a mitzvah. This meal exempts the first born participants from their obligation to fast. We will have a short session of learning that will be followed by Bagels and Shmear. Come to the synagogue or click here to daven with us.

The First Day of Passover Tuesday April 23 at 9:00 a.m.

The morning after the first seder is a great time to come to synagogue to celebrate our freedom. A special prayer for dew, the Hallel Psalms, reading from two Torah scrolls and chanting the prayers to the festival melodies all add up to a true expression of joy in the freedom to be Jewish.

The Second Day of Passover Wednesday, April 23 at 9:00 a.m.

How fortunate we are to have a second chance to celebrate our Freedom by gathering to pray, study Torah and draw strength from one another in our Zoom Room. Erev Seventh Day of Passover Sunday, April 28 at 7:30 p.m.

Seventh Day of Passover Monday, April 29 at 9:00 a.m.

On this day, with a special reading from the Torah, we relive the experience of the parting of the Sea of Reeds. With this day we begin the crescendo with which we end the week of Passover.

Erev Eighth Day of Passover/Yizkor Monday, April 29 at 8:15 p.m.

We begin the concluding day of the Festival of Pesach at night with a Maariv Service including the Yizkor Memorial Service.

Eighth Day of Passover Tuesday, April 13 at 9:00 a.m. Yizkor Service at 11:15 a.m.

We conclude the Festival of Pesach with songs and prayer! On this day, we take time to celebrate the blessing of the memory of our loved ones who are no longer with us.


Dear congregants,



SPONSOR A KIDDUSH



One of the best things about coming to shul on Shabbat is the kiddush that follows services. This is an opportunity, especially after all the Covid restrictions we experienced, to sit with our friends and co-congregants. People are returning to shul to pray and then look forward to the socialization following services, while having something to eat and drink. However, these kiddushes come at a cost.

We are asking those of you who have happy occasions such as an anniversary of a bar/bat mitzvah, births of grandchildren, graduations, weddings, anniversaries, as well as those who have observances of yahrzeits of relatives, to sponsor a kiddush. First, come to shul so that our communal family can celebrate those happy occasions with you as well as responding "Amen" when you recite the Kaddish for your deceased loved ones. This is what a congregational family is about.

For those of you who come to shul in person or on Zoom to observe a yahrzeit, you will be given some type of honor, which could be an aliyah during the Torah reading, opening the Ark or leading an English reading. We invite you to include in your response to the memory of a loved one a contribution to the Kiddush Fund. Your name(s) will be published in our weekly Shabbat Shalom message and the weekly program that we prepare for Shabbat. The full cost of sponsoring a standard kiddush is \$350. Even if you do not want to subsidize the entire cost, a contribution towards the cost will be recognized.

You can also sponsor an Oneg Shabbat, following Friday night services as well. The cost of sponsoring a Friday Night Oneg is \$180.
