From Rabbi Yaffe

The experience of the High Holidays doesn't just happen. There is a lot a preparing to do. For some that means shopping, preparing the



food, inviting family and friends for Yuntif meals and making sure there are apples to dip in the honey. For others it is buying new clothes and having our hair cut and styled. What about spiritual preparing? The daily blasts of the shofar in Elul are a spiritual wake-up call. They remind us to pause and ask: What really matters in my life right now? Where do I need to make amends? How can I bring more kindness, patience, and gratitude into my days? These are not questions we can answer overnight, but if we begin now, the holidays will find us more awake, more open, and more ready to be transformed If we only "show up" at the synagogue for services once the holidays arrive, we may miss their deeper impact. Judaism, in its wisdom, gives us time to prepare—not only to set our tables, buy new clothes and set our hair, but also to ready our hearts and souls.

Here are a few simple practices we might embrace in this season of preparation:

- Take five quiet minutes each day. Use that time to reflect, to breathe, or to say *Modeh Ani* the morning prayer of thanks for the dawn of a new day.
- Reach out to someone you've lost touch with. A small word of connection before the High Holidays can mean more than you realize.
- Choose one mitzvah to strengthen. It may be lighting Shabbat candles, saying a blessing before eating, or setting aside time for learning. One step can shift our perspective.

When the first notes of *Avinu Malkeinu* and *Unetaneh Tokef* fill the sanctuary, when the lulav is raised and the Torah is danced, our experience will be enriched if we arrive spiritually awake. The holidays will still come—been there, done that—but each year offers us the chance to live them anew.

Please be sure to turn to the next page for a spiritual guide for listening to the daily calls of the shofar that will be coming into our email boxes each day of the month of Elul that begins on Monday, August 25th. May this season of Elul guide us gently toward the Days of Awe, and may 5786 be a year of sweetness, strength, and peace for us, for Israel, and for all of humanity.

The Daily Shofar Blasts of Elul

Some Things To Think About When Hearing The Shofar

Turn toward doing good and creating peace and harmony where there is unrest and discord.

This is why the shofar must be curved and not straight.

Rejoice in the creation of the world and God's sovereignty within it.

The sound of the shofar is like the sound of the coronation of a king. When God is sovereign, the laws will bring us justice, security and peace.

Remember that God cares enough for us that God revealed God's self to us at Mount Sinai.

The revelation at Mount Sinai occurred amidst the sound of the shofar.

Never lose hope in the coming of the ultimate redemption and the ingathering of our exiles.

The shofar will sound with the coming of the Messiah.

There is no ideal or value that takes precedence over the sanctity or preciousness of human life.

The shofar is a reminder of the horn of the ram provided by God to be sacrificed by Abraham instead of his son, Isaac.



The Stolen Life of Colette Marceau by Kristin Harmel

The novel tells the story of Colette Marceau, who has been stealing jewels for nearly as long as she can remember, following the centuries-old code of honor instilled in her by her mother: take only from the cruel and unkind, and give to those in need. 

A Tashlich Service

On the first day of Rosh Hashanah, Tuesday, September 23 at 5:00 pm. we will be gathering for Tashlich and Mincha at the entrance of the Daniel Jay Berg Memorial Park in Russell Gardens.

Bring some bread!

Today we come to this body of water to perform the Tashlich ceremony. By throwing bread into the water, we symbolically "cast away" our sins and transgressions so that we may purify our hearts and our souls as the new year begins.

Let us cast away the sin of deception, so that we will mislead no one in word or deed, nor pretend to be what we are not.

Let us cast away the sin of vain ambition, which prompts us to strive for goals which bring neither true fulfillment nor genuine contentment.

Let us cast away the sin of stubbornness, so that we will neither persist in foolish habits nor fail to acknowledge our desire to change.

Let us cast away the sin of envy, so that we will neither be consumed by desire for what we lack nor grow unmindful of the blessings which are already ours

Let us cast away the sin of selfishness, which keeps us from enriching our lives through wider concerns, greater sharing and from reaching out in love to other human beings.

Let us cast away the sin of indifference, so that we may be sensitive to the sufferings of others and responsive to the needs of people everywhere.

Let us cast away the sin of pride and arrogance, so that we can worship God and serve God's purpose in humility and truth.

One of the best things about coming to shul on Shabbat is the kiddush that follows services. This is an opportunity to sit with our friends and co-congregants. People are coming to shul to pray and then look forward to the socialization following services, while having something to eat and drink. However, these kiddushes come at a cost.

We are asking those of you who have happy occasions such as an anniversary of a bar/bat mitzvah, births of grandchildren, graduations, weddings, anniversaries, as well as those who have observances of yahrzeits of relatives, to sponsor a kiddush. First, come to shul so that our communal family can celebrate those happy occasions with you as well as responding "Amen" when you recite the Kaddish for your deceased loved ones. This is what a congregational family is about.

For those of you who come to shul in person or on Zoom to observe a yahrzeit, you will be given some type of honor, which could be an aliyah during the Torah reading, opening the Ark or leading an English reading.
