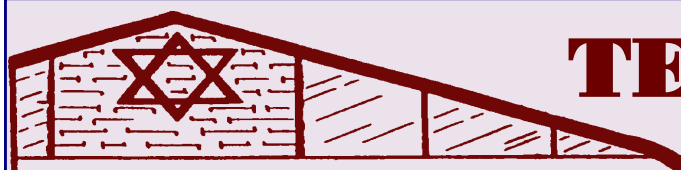

Entering The New Year A Message from Rabbi Yaffe



In less that two weeks from the publication of this Temple Talk, we will be observing Erev Rosh Hashanah, the beginning of the Jewish New Year 5787. Every year on the Jewish calendar the year is written not only with numbers, but with Hebrew letters as well. Those letters can suggest messages that help us to focus our thoughts as we begin a new year.

The Hebrew letters of the coming year are **Tav, Shin, Pey, Zayin**.

As we look at the first letters, **Tav** and **Shin**, it is difficult during this season not to think of **Teshuvah**, the great theme of the month of Elul and the High Holy Days.

Teshuvah is usually translated as repentance, but its more literal meaning is return. During these weeks we are invited to return to God, to one another, to our Jewish tradition, and perhaps most importantly, to the person each of us knows we are capable of becoming.

The Shofar has no words, but its message is unmistakable: Wake up! Pay attention! A New Year is coming! There is still time to make changes!

At the beginning of our journey toward the High Holy Days, we will take an especially meaningful step. On Saturday evening of September 5th, we will join with our friends and neighbors at Temple Israel of Great Neck for an evening of Selichot. The theme of the evening is **"From Many Traditions, One Sacred Song."** Through music, prayer, teaching and reflection, we will begin the High Holy Day season together.

There is something particularly appropriate about beginning the season by joining together with members of a different synagogue. We may belong to different congregations. We may have different customs and melodies. We may come from different backgrounds and approach our Judaism in different ways. Yet when we gather for Selichot, we share the same hopes. We ask ourselves the same questions. We hear the same call to examine our lives, to seek forgiveness, to make changes and begin again.

There is another wonderful message hidden in the letters of **Tav Shin Pey Zayin**, and this one comes directly from the Bible.

The final two letters, **Pey** and **Zayin** form the Hebrew word, **Paz**. **Paz** means fine or refined gold — something precious and of great value.

The word appears beautifully in Psalm 19. The Psalmist speaks about God's Torah, teachings and commandments and declares:

Ha-nechemadim mi-zahav u-mi-paz rav.

“They are more desirable than gold, than much fine gold.”

The Psalmist is saying: we know how much people treasure gold. We know the value we place upon something rare and precious. Yet, there are things in life whose value is greater still.

For the Psalmist, one of those treasures is Torah.

That gives us a wonderful question to carry into **5787**.

What is the *paz* in our lives? What do we consider truly precious?

Our families are precious. Friendship is precious. Health and life are precious. Our Jewish community is precious. The opportunity to help another person is precious. Peace is precious. The ability to forgive and to be forgiven is precious. The time we are given to share with those we love is precious.

This year, that question will have a special poignancy.

Erev Rosh Hashanah falls on September 11, 2026 — the 25th anniversary of the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001.

Twenty-five years may have passed, but the memories remain. We remember the nearly 3,000 lives that were taken. We remember families whose lives were changed forever. We remember the first responders who ran toward danger while others were trying to escape from it. And we remember how suddenly an ordinary September morning became a day that none of us would ever forget.

September 11th taught us, in the most painful way imaginable, about the fragility and preciousness of life. We cannot change what happened twenty-five years ago, and we cannot know what the year ahead will bring. But we can decide how we will use the days that are given to us.

As the sun sets on September 11th this year, we will carry our memories with us. As we enter the synagogue and welcome **5787**, we will remember those whose lives were taken twenty-five years ago, even as we pray to be inscribed in the Book of Life for another year.

On **Rosh Hashanah**, the Shofar asks us to awaken and consider how we are using the precious gift of another year of life.

On **Yom Kippur**, we recognize that our relationships are precious enough to repair, and that none of us should take for granted the opportunity to ask forgiveness or to grant it.

On **Sukkot**, we leave the security of our homes and enter the fragile Sukkah, reminding ourselves that so much of what we possess is temporary and that some of life's greatest treasures cannot be measured in dollars and cents.

And finally, on **Shemini Atzeret and Simchat Torah**, we arrive back at the very image of Psalm 19. We hold the Torah in our arms, dance with it and celebrate the gift that the Psalmist described as even more desirable than **paz**, fine gold.

Then we roll the Torah back and begin its story again.

May **5787** be a year in which we listen more carefully, forgive more readily, appreciate more deeply, and recognize the *paz* — the precious gold — already present in our lives.

May the New Year bring health and happiness to our families, strength and vitality to our congregation, peace and security to Israel, and greater peace and understanding throughout our troubled world.

L'Shanah Tovah Tikateivu — May we all be inscribed in the Book of Life, for a good, sweet and truly precious New Year.

Invited To Lead Us In Prayer And Conduct The Choir For Our Rosh Hashanah And Yom Kippur Services

As I anticipate beginning the New Year together with my synagogue family at Congregation L'Dor V'Dor - Oakland Little Neck Jewish Center, I would like to share a few thoughts with you. While our new lives in Israel have been nothing short of incredible, I've missed the congregation more than words can say. That's why I'm simply overjoyed to return to the bima for the upcoming High Holy Day season! I can not wait to sing, pray, reflect, and CELEBRATE the New Year with my synagogue family once again.

To answer some questions that I know will be asked of me...

Nu, how's life in Israel?

In a word, wonderful. We live in Modiin, midway between Jerusalem and Tel Aviv, with easy access to both cities. We live in a neighborhood filled with many English speakers, offering us the best of both worlds: the privilege to live in our homeland, and the opportunity to socialize primarily with those who speak our language. All of our local friends have made the same difficult choice we did three years ago – to leave behind the comforts of home and to choose Israel as the setting for the next chapter of our lives.

But is it safe?

In the days after October 7 and during the various wars with Iran, life here has been definitely tense. But overall, daily activities here have gone on as normal. With few exceptions, the kids have remained in school, restaurants and cafes are packed, supermarkets are bustling, traffic jams are all-too-common, and we generally feel completely safe. One major change is that we are close with parents whose children currently serve in the IDF – and they haven't slept in nearly three years, up worrying about the safety of their sons and daughters. Seeing the war through their eyes offers a very different perspective.

How are the kids?

Certainly not the Shronkins you remember! Simcha, 26, is married to Dalia and is living in nearby Mevasseret Tzion with our adorable 20-month-old granddaughter Kayla. Simcha received rabbinic ordination from Yeshiva University in May 2025, and is teaching American students in Israel on a gap-year program. Ellie, 23, is a new bride – having married Benny Frank of Hollywood, Florida on August 24. She is about to embark on her final year in nursing school, and is living in Jerusalem with her husband (still sounds strange to say!). Sela, 20, is beginning her second year in business school at the Jerusalem College of Technology, living with friends in Jerusalem. AJ, 18, just began a post-high school gap year program in Acre, after which he will enlist in the IDF. And Tobey, 13, is beginning 8th grade in Modiin. They are all enjoying their new lives in Israel very much!

I'm happy to answer all of your questions when I see you in person. In the meantime, I am thrilled beyond words to begin 5787 as your *shaliach tzibbur*, representative of the congregation, once again. I wish Mairov and my kids could join me in Little Neck, but you cannot imagine how excited I am to reconnect with all of you and to begin the new year right where I belong.

They say “you can't go home again.” But home here I come. I'm so grateful to the congregation for this incredible opportunity! Wishing the community a Shana Tova U'metuka, a happy, healthy, peaceful, and music-filled New Year!

A Guide for Meaningful Participation In High Holiday Services

Prepare For Your High Holiday Experience

Take as much time to spiritually prepare yourself to enter the sanctuary as you do to physically prepare yourself. The person that you are on the inside should be as well put together as the person you are on the outside. Rosh Hashanah is considered to be the Day of Judgment. The day on which we present ourselves before G-d to plead our case for being inscribed in the Book of Life for a year of good health and other blessings. On Yom Kippur the verdict is sealed and the case is closed. In the days prior to Rosh Hashanah take some time to reflect upon who you are and the choices that you have made in the year that has gone by. Make amends with those whom you may have mistreated and resolve to make changes in your life if changes are warranted. Be ready to come before the Sovereign of the universe, standing tall with confidence, pride and humility.

Be a Participant, Not a Spectator

When you arrive for services, strive to be ready with a sense of awe to stand before G-d with prayers in your heart and on your lips. As a member of the congregation you are not a spectator at a service that is being conducted on the bimah, you are a valuable participant without whom the service cannot take place. When it is appropriate, sing along with the cantor and the congregation. At other times, read the English and contemplate the meaning of the prayer. At other times allow your soul to be moved by the melodies and envelop yourself in silent meditation. These are all different ways of actively participating in the service.

Know Before Whom You Stand

The primary goal of being in the sanctuary is to communicate with G-d, not with our neighbors. Talking should be reserved for outside of the sanctuary. Chewing gum while participating in services is inappropriate. Although it is customary for people to leave the sanctuary during services, remember not to leave when the ark is open, when the congregation is standing, when the rabbi is giving his sermon or when the cantor is offering the Hin'ni.

Operation Isaiah

Each year, our congregation participates with congregations throughout the country in a program called Operation Isaiah. This program is in response to the words of the Prophet Isaiah that is part of the Haftarah on Yom Kippur.

*Is this the fast I desire,
A day for men to starve their bodies?
No, this is the fast I desire:
To unlock the fetters of wickedness and
Untie the cords of the yoke to let the
Oppressed go free;
It is to share your bread with the hungry,
and to take the wretched into your home...
(When) you offer your compassion to the
Hungry and satisfy the hungry creature...

A Tashlich Service

On the second day of Rosh Hashanah, Sunday, September 13 at 5:00 pm.
we will be gathering for Tashlich and Mincha at the entrance of
the Daniel Jay Berg Memorial Park in Russell Gardens.

Bring some bread!

Today we come to this body of water to perform the Tashlich ceremony. By throwing bread into the water, we symbolically “cast away” our sins and transgressions so that we may purify our hearts and our souls as the new year begins.

Let us cast away the sin of deception, so that we will mislead no one in word or deed, nor pretend to be what we are not.

Let us cast away the sin of vain ambition, which prompts us to strive for goals which bring neither true fulfillment nor genuine contentment.

Let us cast away the sin of stubbornness, so that we will neither persist in foolish habits nor fail to acknowledge our desire to change.

Let us cast away the sin of envy, so that we will neither be consumed by desire for what we lack nor grow unmindful of the blessings which are already ours.

Let us cast away the sin of selfishness, which keeps us from enriching our lives through wider concerns, greater sharing and from reaching out in love to other human beings.

Let us cast away the sin of indifference, so that we may be sensitive to the sufferings of others and responsive to the needs of people everywhere.

Let us cast away the sin of pride and arrogance, so that we can worship God and serve God's purpose in humility and truth.

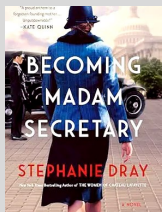
